It provides tools for assessing impacts, setting priorities, and tracking progress. Resources like the SDG Impact Assessment Tool and SDG Compass support implementation, with expected outcomes including enhanced sustainability practices and collaboration. Examples from University College Cork and University College Galway show successful SDG Framework integration in higher education.

Challenge: Proper Linkage, Frameworks, and Alignment with SDGs in Sustainable Entrepreneurship

Tool Name: SDG Alignment Toolkit for University Entrepreneurship

The SDG framework is designed to assist universities, departments, and faculties in aligning their orientation strategies for sustainable entrepreneurship with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). It provides a structured approach to integrating SDG-linked objectives into entrepreneurial education, research, and practice, ensuring relevance to global sustainability challenges.



Instructions: How to Use + Expected Outcomes

1. Review the "Getting Started with SDGs in Universities" guide for foundational strategies.
2. Map institutional activities to relevant SDGs using the SDG Compass.
3. Use the SDG Impact Assessment Tool to evaluate current impact.
4. Align curricula, research, and partnerships with identified goals.
5. Apply findings to develop targeted actions, policies, and innovations.



Expected Outcomes

1. Clear SDG-aligned strategy and goals.
2. Sustainable innovation in curricula and research.
3. Enhanced university-industry-community collaboration.
4. Improved ability to measure and communicate impact.

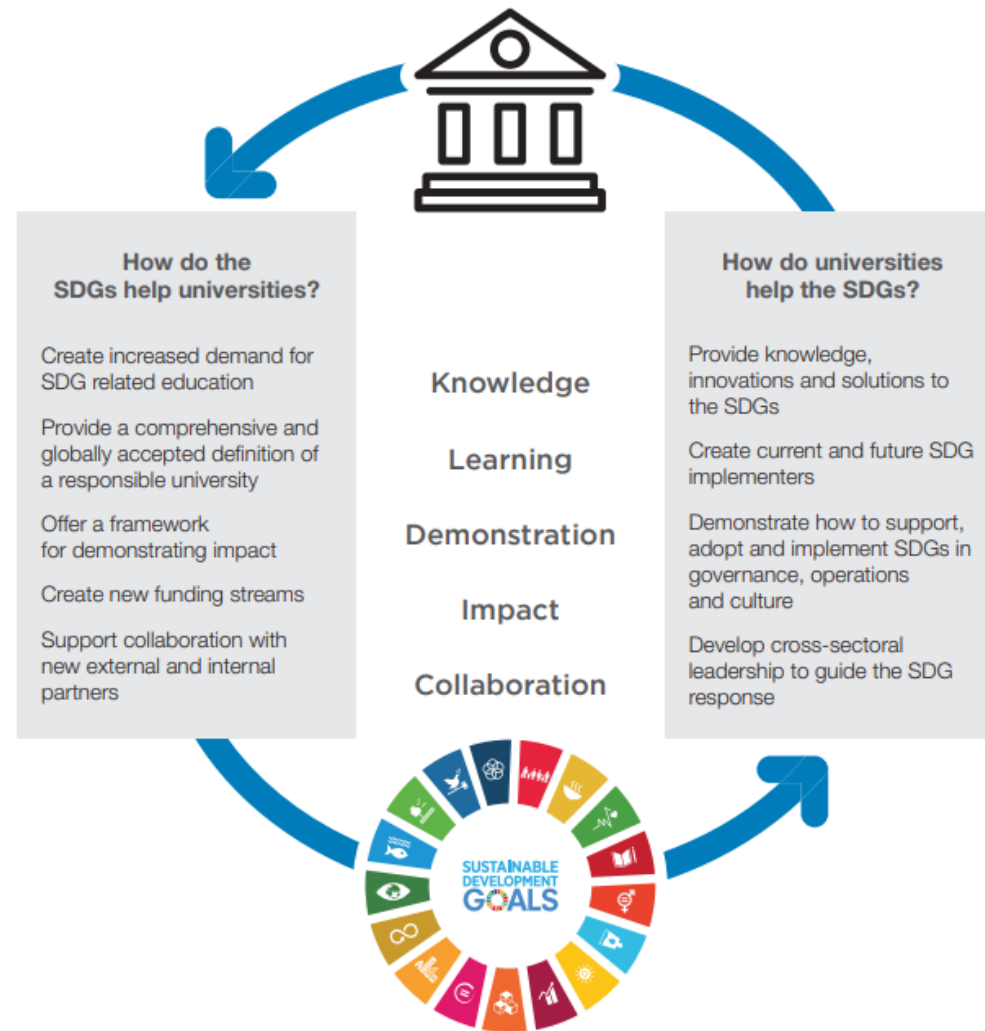


Universities Role in Supporting the SDGs

SDG Framework Description

The SDG Framework enables third level institutions to:

- ☐ Map their entrepreneurial activities and strategies to specific SDGs.
- ☐ Design programs, curricula, and research initiatives that enable sustainable innovation.
- ☐ Establish clear metrics for evaluating the social, economic, and environmental impacts of entrepreneurship activities.
- ☐ Facilitate collaboration between academic institutions, industry, and communities to address sustainability challenges effectively.



Classification Criteria

- ✓ **SDG Relevance:** Align activities with one or more SDGs (e.g., SDG 9: Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure, SDG 12: Responsible Consumption and Production).
- ✓ **Scale of Impact:** Focus on local, regional, or global impact.
- ✓ **Stakeholder Involvement:** Engage lecturers, students, faculty managers and administrators, industry partners, and community members.
- ✓ **Type of Initiative:** Categorise activities as educational, research-driven, or community-based.

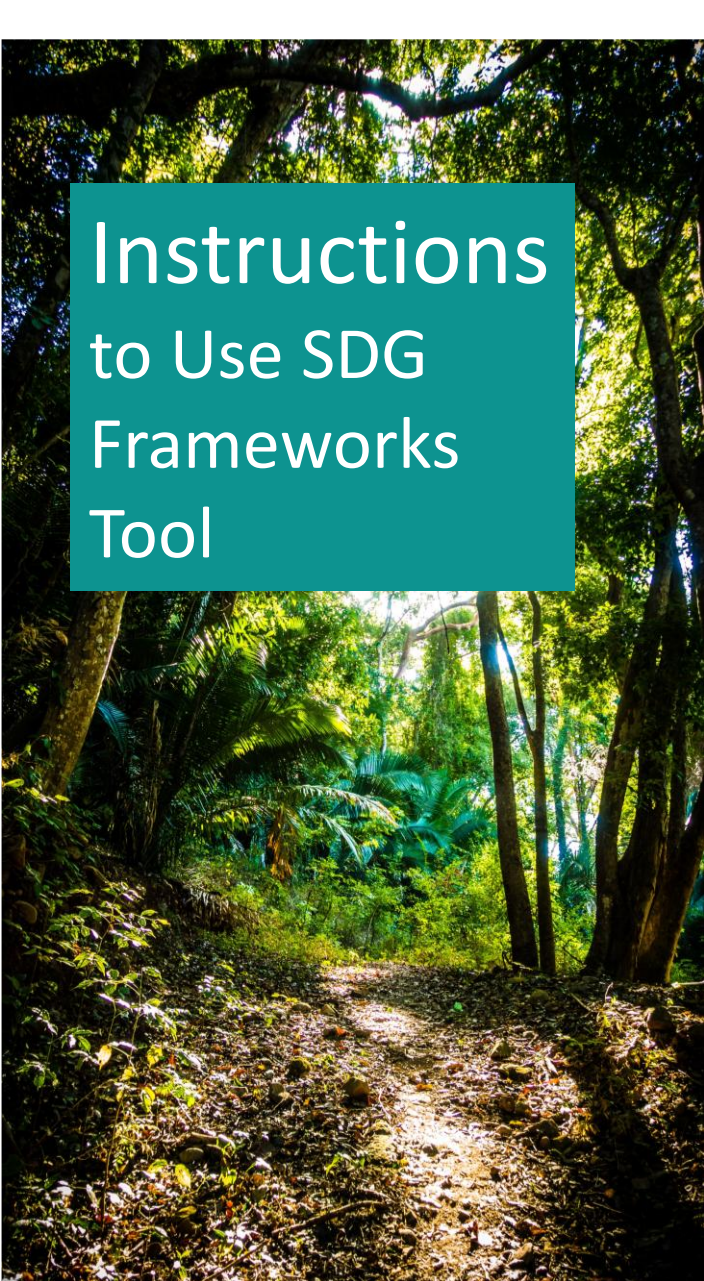

The role of an SDG Champion is to act as an advocate and promoter of the SDGs and as a good practice example of how an organisation can contribute to the SDGs and integrate the SDGs into their work and activities. As part of its Champion tenure University of Galway hosted the Government of Ireland national SDG Champions on campus for a day of discussion and dialogue on the themes of Climate Action (SDG 13) and Partnerships (SDG17).”

Orientation and Awareness

Conduct workshops to familiarise faculty and students with SDGs and their relevance to entrepreneurship.

Mapping Current Activities

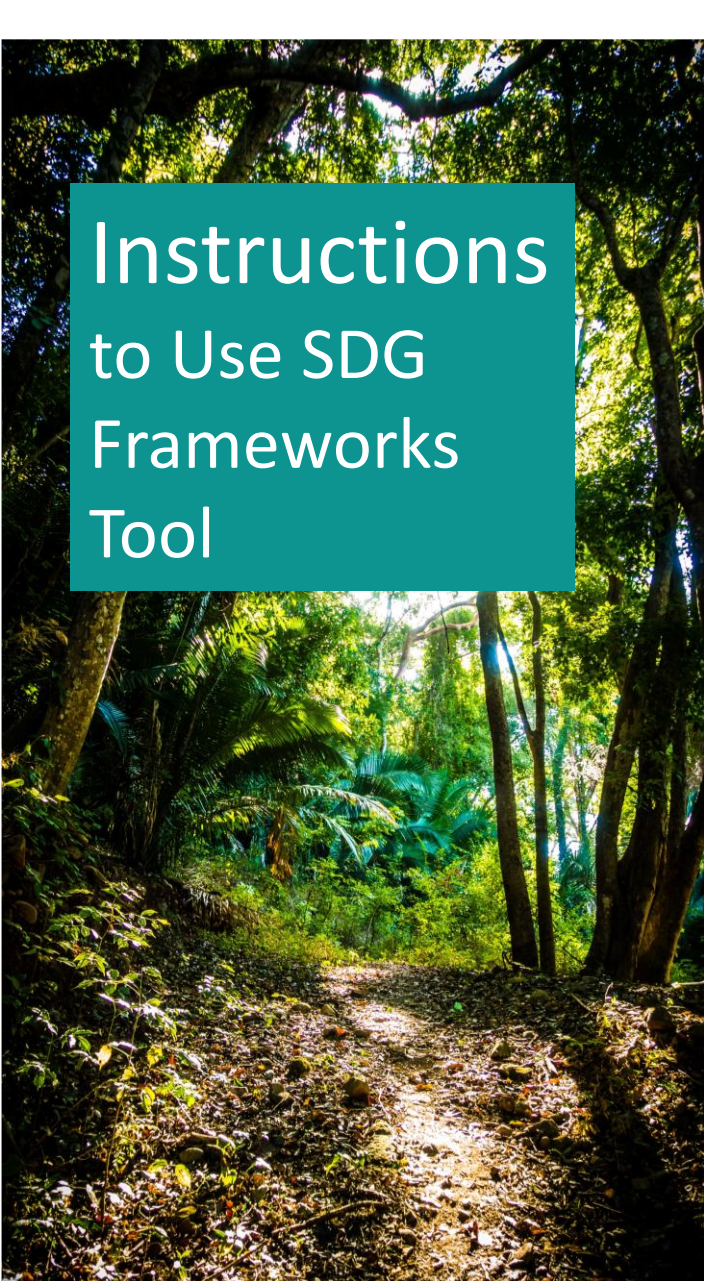
Use a mapping exercise to identify existing entrepreneurial initiatives and their potential links to SDGs.

3

Framework Application

Apply the framework to evaluate and adjust current strategies to align with specific SDGs.





Instructions to Use SDG Frameworks Tool

4

Capacity Building

Provide training in sustainable entrepreneurship practices and SDG impact assessment.

5

Implementation and Monitoring

Develop action plans, implement initiatives, and regularly monitor progress using SDG-aligned indicators.

6

Reporting and Sharing

Share outcomes with stakeholders through reports, case studies, and academic publications.
